



2024 National Convention Report

Hosted by the Mu Omicron Chapter of Columbus State University May 29th, 2024 – June 2nd, 2024

The 2024 National Convention was held in Columbus, Georgia on the Columbus State University, Riverpark campus. The host chapter was the Mu Omicron chapter.

The Executive Committee met on Wednesday, May 29^{th} , 2024, to discuss the business and financial matters of $\beta\beta\beta$. Registration for students and their guests was also on Wednesday, May 20^{th} from 12pm - 8pm. The welcome Meet & Greet meeting was held in Frank Brown Hall on Wednesday evening with Dr. Julie Ballenger, TriBeta's current President, opening the convention and welcoming everyone to CSU. Dr. Christi Magrath, SE 2 District Director, lead the chapter roll call with a fun "Riff Off" activity where the last word of the person had to be the first word for the next person to open their introduction with. A dessert social was held in the lobby area of Frank Brank Hall after. Convention attendees stayed on campus in the Broadway Crossing or Clearview Hall dorms.

There was a total of 60 presentations, 38 poster and 22 oral. There were 5 poster presentation groupings into the following biological areas of focus: Molecular & Microbiology – Group 1 & 2, Ecology & Environment, Biomedical Science, and Organismal. There were 3 oral presentation groupings into the following biological areas of focus: Molecular & Microbiology, Ecology, Environment, & Organismal, and Biomedical Science.

All poster presentations were on Thursday morning in the exhibitor halls of the Corn Center for the Visual Arts. The first ever silent auction was also set up in the exhibitor halls for attendees to begin browsing items. Light breakfast refreshments were served. All oral presentations were on Thursday afternoon in the lecture classrooms of Frank Brown Hall.





Dr. Katie Hughes, a professor at Mercer University School of Medicine, Columbus, a former student and colleague of Dr. Julie Ballenger, TriBeta's current President, was the keynote speaker on Thursday night. Dr. Hughes is a TriBeta member at the Psi chapter at Winthrop University from when she was an undergraduate student. Dr. Hugues talked about how we all are ambassadors of biology everywhere we go with our curiosity for learning more, understanding why things are the way they are, and encouraging that curiosity in those around us. Dr. Hughes was awarded honorary membership with the Mu Omicron chapter as a thank you for speaking, as well as a $\beta\beta\beta$ graduation regalia and merchandise.

Field trips were on Friday and Saturday. Field trips included the following attractions.
